
#### FAITH BEYOND YOUTH GROUP

### MINISTRY ASSESSMENT

A good plan starts with knowing where you are. As researchers and leaders, we've noticed that what matters most in assessing youth ministry reality isn't what we as adults think but what teenagers think. So before creating your map, below are thirty questions to measure your ministry's progress on each of the five points of the Faith Beyond Youth Group Compass through the lens of your students.

You can score your ministry by yourself. But it is probably much better if you ask a few teenagers, youth group graduates, parents, and/or youth ministry volunteers for their input. In fact, ideally you would ask a diverse cross section of your students to answer these questions to unearth any gaps between your perceptions and their actual experiences.



## QUESTIONS TO MEASURE YOUR PROGRESS USING THE FAITH BEYOND YOUTH GROUP COMPASS

#### **Cultivate Trust**


