Character

We have to help student develop good *character*

We have to talk with students not at students

What teenagers need is a <u>relationship</u> with Jesus that changes not just ninety minutes of their week but <u>100 percent</u> of their lives, because if a teenager's faith is just a <u>youth group</u> faith, it's too <u>small</u> to captivate their entire week.

So, <u>character</u> from scripture matters when we define character as: "Living out Jesus' goodness every day by loving God and our neighbors.

If *faith* is what is believed, then *character* is faith lived out in real time.

The goal of Christian formation isn't just to make good kids. It's to form <u>disciples</u> with the character of Christ.

Two of the primary differences between good kids and teenagers with Christlike character are *action* and *motivation*.

When it comes to students' faith, we <u>get</u> what we <u>are.</u> Likewise, when it comes to character, we get what we are.

How people view God is one of the <u>strongest</u> predictors of a range of social and moral attitudes.

We focus our youth ministry around information transfer. The issue we find with young people is that the longing of their hearts is not to *know* more but to *belong* more.

Identity = Who am I?

Belonging = Where do I fit?

<u>Purpose</u> = What difference can I make?

Faith Beyond Youth Group Compass

The five points of the Faith Beyond Youth Group Compass are Cultivate <u>Trust</u>, Model <u>Faith</u>, Teach for <u>Transformation</u>, Practice <u>Together</u> and Make <u>Meaning</u>.

And they are constantly assessing whether they can trust you to be there for them when-not *if*, but *when* they make a mistake, or their life unravels.

We can never go faster in <u>building</u> faith and <u>character</u> than the speed of students; trust in us.

Trust is built in very <u>small</u> gestures.

Remember Jeus built trust through consistency and closeness.

Character is *caught* before it is *taught*

Many youth group graduates leave church knowing <u>what</u> they're supposed to believe but not <u>why</u> it matters or <u>how</u> to live out their faith in their daily lives.

Let them *lead*

Equip teenagers to teach

Practicing together builds muscle *memory*

Practicing together equips you as a discipler of teenagers

What we don't want to do is communicate an idealized Christianity to young people by overfocusing on Jesus' perfect example and shaming or pressuring them into behavior modification. Rather, we want to communicate that throughout the disbelief, mistakes, and failures of his disciples, Jesus never <u>abandoned</u> them.

But remember we are not just hanging out with teenagers. In order to consistently Make Meaning we must be *intentional*

Know the *purpose* behind your ministry's work.
